Archaeology Abroad

This is perhaps the most useful for an overview since 1972 only.

Archaeology Abroad is based at the Institute of Archaeology, University College London, and was first published in 1972. The **Archaeology Abroad Bulletin** comes out annually in spring and provides information about hundreds. In addition to excavation and field school listings, bulletins also include illustrated feature articles, reports and dig reviews by Fieldwork Award recipients, comprehensive guidance notes and advice about joining a dig abroad, plus extensive information sections on a wide range of relevant organisations, societies, publications, scholarships and awards

From the British Institute at Ankara:

1. **Anatolian Archaeology**. Anatolian Archaeology is a 'magazine-style' publication which is the BIAA's annual report on research supported. Short articles are written by the project directors themselves and are fully illustrated. Editor Gina Coulthard Volumes 1 (1995) - 2 (1996) and 4 – 10 (2004)

2. **Anatolian Studies**. Anatolian Studies contains articles focused on Turkey and the Black Sea littoral in all academic disciplines within the arts, humanities, social sciences and environmental sciences as related to human occupation and history. Articles are in English and are accessible to a wide academic readership. Anatolian Studies is a refereed journal.

3. **BIAA Monograph Series**. The BIAA publishes scholarly monographs relating to the archaeology and history of Turkey, with a particular emphasis on publishing the results of Institute-funded research. BIAA monographs are distributed by Oxbow Books through whom orders should be made.

The British Institute in Eastern Africa:

1. **Azania**. Azania is a leading archaeological journal, presenting peer-reviewed work of international quality. It has been published annually since 1966. From 2009 Azania will be renamed 'Azania: archaeological research in Africa' and its remit will be expanded. It will

publish peer-reviewed papers and briefer research reports, as well as book and conference reviews, on all aspects of archaeological research in Africa.

2. **Journal of Eastern African Studies** The Journal of Eastern African Studies, launched in 2007, features academic articles from a wide range of disciplines. JEAS is produced in cooperation with Taylor and Francis Ltd. and appears three times a year in March, July and November.

From the British Institute of Persian Studies:

1. **IRAN** is a refereed journal which is published annually and enjoys a high international reputation. Volume 46 was out in December 2008. IRAN includes articles on the whole range of Persian Studies and not only on work sponsored by the Institute. There is also a section on recent archaeological excavations in Iran. As one of the foremost journals in the field, IRAN is sold and distributed to a wide range of libraries, institutions and individuals throughout the world.

From the British School at Athens:

1. Each year the School publishes a major research journal - the **Annual of the British School at Athens** - along with Archaeological Reports, a summary of archaeological fieldwork in the Hellenic world (produced jointly with the Hellenic Society), and an Annual Report.

3. A series of BSA Studies presents conference proceedings and reviews of the current state of research in all areas of Greek studies.

4. The **Fitch Laboratory Occasional Papers** are a continuing series committed to current topics in archaeological science.

From the British School at Rome:

1. The **annual journal Papers of the British School at Rome** publishes work carried out in Rome and Italy primarily by the BSR and its award-holders.

2. Other publications include monographs and collected essays on archaeology, art history, classical studies and history (including material from the BSR archive).

From the Council for British Research in the Levant (CBRL):

1. **The CBRL Bulletin** The Bulletin of the Council for British Research in the Levant (formerly Newsletter) is devoted to providing stimulating articles on current CBRL-funded and affiliated research projects. The CBRL Bulletin also contains a comprehensive 'news' section that includes reports from the Regional Director and staff, as well as conference and exhibition reviews and an overview of recent and forthcoming CBRL publications.

2. **Levant** is the Journal of the Council for British Research in the Levant Volume 41 (2009), 2 issues per year Levant is the international peer-reviewed journal of the Council for British Research in the Levant (CBRL), a British Academy-sponsored institute with research centres in Amman and Jerusalem, but which also supports research in Syria, Lebanon and Cyprus.

Contributions from a wide variety of areas, including anthropology, archaeology, geography, history, language and literature, political studies, religion, sociology and tourism, are encouraged. While contributions to *Levant* should be in English, the journal actively seeks to publish papers from researchers of any nationality who are working in its areas of interest.

3. **CBRL Monographs**, The CBRL publishes monographs which present significant new contributions to the study of the humanities and social sciences (e.g. archaeology, geography, history, literature, linguistics and social anthropology), as relevant to the countries of the Levant (Cyprus, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, the Palestinian Territories and Syria). Monographs are published in the Levant Supplementary Series (distributed by Oxbow). Previous monographs have also appeared in the British Academy Monographs in Archaeology series (distributed by Oxford University Press).
